




Chart 1. Arrivals March 2021 - March 2022 (12 months) – See Appendix Table 1





Chart 2. Transfers to the Mainland March 2021 - March 2022 (12 months) - See Appendix Table 2






4. Distribution of Asylum Seekers per Region and Accommodation scheme

The goal of the Government is the equal and fair distribution (1%) of asylum seekers in all the regions of the country, with the exception of the first reception points. There was a general decrease in the number of residents in most regions by 54% (from 59.212 to 27.396) during the last 12 months.

Chart 5. Distribution of Asylum Seekers per Region and Accommodation scheme – See Appendix Table 4 & 5




Chart 7. Pre-Registrations of applications per Regional Office or Asylum Unit and per Region for the reference month (March 2022) – See Appendix Table 7b




Chart 8. Applications for International Protection per year. For 2022 applications are calculated till the month of reference (March) - See Appendix Table 8a







Chart 9. Applications for International Protection per Regional Office or Asylum Unit and per Region for the month of reference (March 2022) - See Appendix Table 8b





Chart 11. Appeals that have been lodged the 3-months of 2022 per location and month – See Appendix Table 10

- The average time for a 2nd Instance decision to be issued is 89 days since the date of appeal lodging, while it is 53 days from the date of appeal discussion.
- The number of appellants who applied and benefited from free legal aid is 2.395 (785 in January, 805 in February and 805 in March).
- The total of pending decisions of Appeals Authority (4.550 pending) consists of cases that have been discussed in 2021 and 2022, as a decision has been issued on each of the total of the 22.881 appeals that were discussed in 2020. Also, out of the total 16.015 appeals that have been discussed in 2021, 195 are pending while the remaining 4.355 pending appeals consists of cases that was discussed in the 1st Quarter of 2022 (2.227 pending) or will be discussed till August 2022 (2.128 pending).







Chart 16. Recognition Rate in 1st & 2nd Instance. See Appendix Table 12c





Chart 17. Applications for annulment of 2nd Instance Decisions before the Administrative Court per year of lodging. See Appendix Table 13

The "Helios" program is funded by the European Union. Its purpose is to promote integration support for beneficiaries of International Protection and is implemented with:


- accommodation support
- through integration courses (learning the Greek language, enhancing social skills)
- Job counselling sessions
- raising awareness of the host Community and promoting social cohesion.


The Ministry of Immigration and Asylum monitors the implementation of the program, which is implemented by the International Organization for Migration. From 16/07/2019 until 4/4/2022, 34.980 people have registered in the program,

while 16.713 recognized refugees receive financial assistance for renting a house. It is worth noting that in March 182 new leases were added to the accommodation support of the "Helios" program (regarding the period from 2/3/2022 till 4/4/2022). At the same time 6.950 beneficiaries of International Protection have been enrolled in the integration courses and 7.639 people are attending job counseling sessions.

In March 2022 the departures from Greece to third countries outside the EU, as well as to member states of the European Union are the following:

- 233 forced deportations and returns of third country nationals, based on agreements of the European Union, but also bilateral agreements of our country.
- 265 voluntary departures through IOM.
- 66 voluntary departures of immigrants from our country to their countries of origin.
- 152 transfers to Member States of the European Union under the Dublin Regulation.
- 5 minors left with the relocation program of unaccompanied minors.
- 12 people seeking International Protection were transferred to Italy in the context of voluntarily relocation program.
- 23 Beneficiaries of International Protection moved to France as part of a relocation program implemented in cooperation with IOM funded by the European Commission.
- Returns under the EU Turkey Joint Declaration have not been made since March due to Covid-19. It should be noted that despite the lifting of the Covid-19 measures, from 01/06 the requests of missions-returns of the Greek authorities have not been answered.
- A total of 756 people left the country in March, while 968 arrived.




Chart 20. Returns-Departures – See Appendix Table 17




Chart 21. Arrivals of Ukrainians (March 2022) - See Appendix Table 18




Chart 22. Total Ukrainian Residents & Online pre-registrations of applications (March 2022) - See Appendix Table 19 & 20
